Dr. Huntley called the meeting to order. It was moved (Fisher) and seconded (Killacky) that the minutes of the March 21 meeting be approved. Motion carried. None opposed; no abstentions.

<u>Update from the Dean – Edelma Huntley</u>

- Dr. Marie Hoepfl is the recipient of the Graduate Council Technology Teacher Education Teacher Educator of the Year Award. Only one recipient is selected in the United States.
- There will be a Graduate Faculty meeting on Wednesday, April 27 at 5:00 p.m. in 114 Belk Library and Information Commons. (Note: This was rescheduled to August.)
- There are four finalists of the Provost Search invited to campus beginning the week of April 25. There will be two candidates per week. For additional information visit: www.provostsearch.appstate.edu.

Reports/Announcements from Graduate Studies - Dr. Holly Hirst

- The NC House budget proposal is to cut NC tuition remission by 20%. This affects out-of-state graduate students. The NC House is also discussing eliminating the Academic Common Market which grants out-of-state students in-state tuition rates. The state will not revoke those currently enrolled provided the students remain eligible. Academic Common Market students will not be accepted beginning Fall 2012.
- Graduate Studies staff will participate in three days of training for DegreeWorks. The student checksheet will show what is required, what is completed, and what is remaining. This feature will be available to advisors by next September and to students within the year.
- The April 15 report submitted to General Administration shows that graduate admission applications have increased by 250-300 each year, mostly in highly competitive programs.
- Council members are encouraged to read the Graduate Studies report attached.

Reports/Announcements from Sponsored Programs – Ms. Charna Howson

• Proposal numbers and the dollar value of submissions and awards continue to be ahead of this time last year. We have currently exceeded the dollar value of FY 2010. At the end of

- March, there were 243 proposal submissions, in excess of \$48M.
- Training for AGrants will begin for institutional approvers from May through June 30 (deans, department heads, and alternate approvers).

- Work to secure and allocate efficiently an increasing amount of resources, including assistantships, fellowships, tuition scholarships, and research grants, consistent with the needs of graduate education.

VOTE 2: Motion unanimously approved.

2. The Task Force on Graduate Education recommended the development of a timeline to review graduate programs. It was requested that data gathered for the respective accreditation agencies be allowable for program review purposes. If interested in helping to draft the graduate program review timeline, notify Dr. Hirst via email. Discussion will continue in the Fall.

New Business

1. <u>EduVentures Survey</u> – Tom Fisher and Mary Englebert

In late Fall, the Provost held a retreat on distance education. What came out was the observation that there was no good data on graduate programs. Being a member of EduVentures, questions were drafted, and a survey was conducted in western NC. Responses were posted on April 15 and distributed to Council members. Council members can request additional information to be included in the final report.

The survey asked the likelihood of enrolling in graduate-level certificate or degree programs, reasons for not enrolling, and preferred mode of delivery – whether face-to-face or hybrid classes. Dr. Englebert indicated that similar questions were asked of enrolled students in the Fall, and the responses mimicked EduVentures.

Additional data mining requested: breakdowns by major. Additional requests should be sent to Tom Fisher.

Dr. Huntley suggested that the survey be shared with University Advancement as it corroborates the Brand Survey, showing that people don't know that graduate programs are out there. Appalachian has filled needs but has not created a presence. Graduate programs should be encouraged to see what programs could be delivered in the field to attract students.

2. <u>Report from the Student Committee</u>. Dr. Davis reported that the committee met on April 7 to review applications for the Chancellor's Fellows, Provost Fellowships, and Alumni Fellowships. There were 107 applications that exceeded the minimum. Recommendations were made to the Graduate School, and a backup list was provided as students decline.

The NC General Assembly is still discussing out-of-state tuition waivers. Appalachian is losing students because it cannot guarantee these waivers.

3. <u>Report from the Faculty Committee</u>. Dr. Hoepfl reported that by early Fall the committee will have a recommendation concerning the Graduate Faculty language in the Faculty Handbook.

4. Other

- Dr. Davis announced there will be retirement party for Dr. Jack Mulgrew at Woodlands.
 Dr. Mulgrew is a long-time professor in Human Development and Psychological Counseling.
- Members rotating off of the Council: Dr. Killacky, Dr. Hoepfl, and Mr. Abbott. These members should contact Dr. Huntley if they wish to continue on the Graduate Council. With Mr. Fisher's retirement, there will be a new representative from Extension and Distance Education.
- Dr. Bazzini chairs the graduate education portion of the SACS self-study comprehensive standard review. By May 6, the first draft will be submitted to Georgia Donovan. Graduate degrees must look more rigorous than undergraduate degrees, with the curriculum covering knowledge of the literature as well as engaging students in professional research activity. The report identifies 3 of 50 graduate programs which do not demonstrate this rigor on paper. One is closing; another is merging into another program. Regarding knowledge of the discipline, 4 of 50 are not demonstrating compliance on paper, of which one is closing. None of the graduate certificates are currently out of compliance. Dr. Root also serves on this committee.

Graduate Studies Report URC and Graduate Council April 2011

- (1) The work on implementing the degreeworks advising tool is proceeding. We will be arranging meetings with each program director over the course of the summer to refine the tool.
- (2) We have no definitive news (as of 4/12/11) regarding the fate of the North Carolina Tuition Scholarship funds or the Academic Common Market Program. The House plan has cut the NCTS by more than 10% and has eliminated ACM effective 2012-13. The Senate may take further steps.
- (3) The URC is working on reviewing the GRAM proposals, and we hope to announce recipients by April 21.

Graduate Council

April Announcements

- Year-to-date award information is available on the Web.
 - By the end of March we had submitted 243 proposals requesting a total of \$48,685,670. Requests are up in number only 9%, but are just shy of the year-end total for FY2010.
 - Likewise, we saw slow steady growth in awards during March. The number of awards was 10% higher than March of 2010 with only 3% growth in the overall award value as congress continued to wrestle with budgets and continuing resolutions. March included one new ARRA award to the University's Physical Plant.
 - Proposal submission counts continue to be off due to lagging documentation and the amount of current submission activity. For instance, in March OSP counted 29 fully completed submissions and 14 awards, but staff members are also actively engaged with 54 other proposals in varying stages of completion, and management of currently active awards.
- The Office of Sponsored Programs/Special Funds Accounting departmental assignment list is now complete and will be posted to the Web by the end of this week (April 11 – 15). A copy is attached for your convenience.
- Charlotte Smith taught a second budget development workshop for 7 faculty/staff members on April 5th in the Academic Affairs Conference Room.
- AGrants/RAMSeS testing continues with plans still progressing to train
 institutional approvers from May through June 30th. We are currently surveying
 department chairs and deans regarding availability and authorization alternate
 approvers who will be trained at the same time. These individuals will be given
 access to the test site prior to and after training. Moreover, OSP staff is working
 to complete several short online tutorials to complement workshop training.

Upcoming Events

 The Office of Sponsored Programs is collaborating with the Office of Proposal Development to host an NIH workshop for ASU and neighboring institutions this fall. These offices are also collaborating to host a NCBC workshop for ASU
