Dr. Huntley called the meeting to order. It was moved (Ledford) and seconded (Root) that the minutes of the February 21 meeting be approved. Motion carried. None opposed; no abstentions.

<u>Update from the Dean – Edelma Huntley</u>

• There is a commission looking at the duplication of programs across the UNC System. With budget cuts, this may impact programs across the state. It is hoped that the commission does not include private colleges in their review of program offerings.

Council members are encouraged to talk to their departments and colleges to think how ASU can label its programs as different, unique, and providing a program that is not duplicated elsewhere in the UNC System. Some universities are taking this as an opportunity to review programs due to the NC budget crisis. For example, Chapel Hill eliminated a master's degree, and then collaborated with Duke University for a dual degree.

• Provost Search. There are 79 applications with 40 viable candidates. The committee is expecting to receive 40-50 more. The committee will meet on March 28 to select candidates to invite to airport interviews (April 4-5). Campus interview dates are April 18-19, April 25-26, May 2-3, and May 4-5. The committee is speaking often with the Chancellor to keep communication open with this search.

Nationwide searches are now being conducted in both Fall and Spring. There are approximately ten other Provost searches in progress.

• The State is reviewing Facilities and Administration (F&A) funds across the state, with a possible 10% reduction in funding. Although the state cannot take F&A funds, it can reduce the state allocation by this amount.

Announcements from Graduate Studies - Holly Hirst

- Council members were encouraged to read the Graduate Studies report (attached).
- The Graduate Student Association Senate will hold a fundraiser on April 1 at 8:00 p.m. at Char restaurant. Contributed pies will be available for auction or tasting.

• Dr. Huntley distributed a talking points paper regarding NC Tuition Scholarships. ASU successfully worked to increase international student enrollment, and now the funding to assist these students is uncertain. Council members are asked to speak to their development officers about financial support for students.

Announcements from Sponsored Programs – Charna Howson

- Council members were encouraged to read the Sponsored Programs reports (attached).
- A-Grants/RAMSeS training will begin in May for persons authorized to approve proposals going off-campus.
- Awards are \$13.3M for the end of February. Awards in 2009-10 totaled \$17M.

<u>Announcements from Proposal Development – Pollyanne Frantz</u>

- Council members were encouraged to read the Proposal Development report (attached).
- Workshops were conducted in March for GRAM Fellows on locating and evaluating funding opportunities and an overview of grant proposal writing fundamentals.

<u>Announcements from Research Protections – Julie Taubman</u>

- Council members were encouraged to read the Research Protections report (attached).
- Research Protections is working to transition compliance with the Cuban Asset Control Regulations to the Office of International Education and Development.
- Graduate Studies had its first international student in a sensitive department. The Graduate School had to counsel with the department to discuss restricted access when this student arrives.

<u>Curriculum Proposals from the Academic Policies Committee – Holly Hirst</u>

MOTION: The Academic Policies Committee approves the two course proposals from Sociology effective Fall 2012.

OLD BUSINESS – Continued discussion of the mission, vision, and goals of the Graduate School. Below is the revised version.

Mission

The Cratis D. Williams Graduate School supports the academic and professional development of graduate students by offering a challenging intellectual environment that promotes shared learning and discovery. A supportive graduate faculty advances graduate students' curiosity, passion, and knowledge, engaging students as colleagues and guiding students to become active contributors to knowledge, creativity, and innovation in their disciplines.

Guiding Principle

The Graduate School accomplishes its mission by developing, fostering, and monitoring quality graduate degree and certificate programs; ensuring a highly qualified and engaged graduate faculty; and supporting graduate students through fellowships, tuition scholarships, assistantships, student awards, and research grants.

Vision

With emphasis on graduate education as a fundamental part of the University's strategic priorities, the Graduate School aspires to be recognized for innovative and responsive graduate programs that provide relevant academic and professional experiences for its students, preparing them for rewarding careers in the increasingly diverse communities of North Carolina, the nation, and the world.

Goals

The Graduate School advocates the following educational goals for each graduate student:

- Students will demonstrate mastery of the discipline at a level of rigor commensurate with post baccalaureate experience.
- Students will develop and apply skills in current research and/or professional practices to address complex issues in an increasingly diverse and global society.
- Students will acquire an understanding of and commitment to professional ethical standards.
- Students will communicate effectively in ways that are appropriate for a professional.

In support of these educational goals and with the collaboration of the colleges, schools, and departments, the Cratis D. Williams Graduate School will promote graduate education and will:

- Work to maintain and increase the quality and currency of graduate programs through:
 - o ongoing assessment of degree and certificate programs in the context of the University's mission:
 - o enforcement of admissions standards or criteria that ensure student success;
 - o validation of student progress and adherence to the curriculum;
 - o review and appointment of the graduate faculty.
- Provide guidance and support for recruiting increasingly diverse and qualified applicant pools.
- Work to secure and allocate efficiently an increasing amount of resources, including
 assistantships, fellowships, tuition scholarships, and research grants, consistent with the
 needs of graduate education.

It was moved (Hoepfl) and seconded (Root) that the edits as discussed be approved.

It was noted that "graduate education" is not a core value of the university. The wording was changed to "the University's strategic priority."

Dr. Hoepfl accepted the amendment. Second by Dr. Root.

MOTION: To accept the mission, guiding principle, and vision of the Graduate School.

VOTE: Motion carried. None opposed; no abstentions.

Discussion of the goals will continue at the April meeting.

Other

- 1. Dr. Davis asked the Student Development Committee to meet following this meeting. The committee will be reviewing Chancellor's, Provost and Alumni Fellowships.
- 2. Dr. Hoepfl reported that the Faculty Development Committee will have recommendations at the April meeting. She and Dr. Huntley will discuss convening the Graduate Faculty.
- 3. Dr. Davis expressed appreciation to Dr. Bazzini and her subcommittee for its work with graduate education standards and requirements for reaffirmation of accreditation. Council members also serving on the committee are Dr. Root and Dr. Henson. Don Cox chairs the Institutional Effectiveness: Academic Departments subcommittee, also reviewing graduate program mission, vision, goals, and assessment plans.

It was moved that the meeting be adjourned.

Graduate Studies Report To the Graduate Council and the University Research Council Holly Hirst March 2011

- (1) The deadline for the GRAM (graduate research assistant mentoring) and DRA (diversity research assistant) programs is April 1. We will be awarding up to 10 GRAMs and up to 5 DRAs for academic year 2011-12.
- (2) We still have no word on the fate of the NC Tuition Scholarship funding that we usually receive through the legislature's allocation to the UNC System. The current budget discussions in Raleigh have these funds on the list of cuts needed for balancing next year's state budget.

If we do not get these funds, we will be unable to offer any tuition assistance to non-NC resident graduate assistants, including international students. This will severely limit the number of non-NC students we can recruit and retain. We are seeking funding through several channels to cover the NC Tuition Scholarships for the current international students, who were brought here under the assumption that we would have this funding for them for two years if they retained high GPAs.

- (3) There are 87 fellowship applications that meet or exceed the minimum GPA/Test Score requirements, and the Student Committee of the Graduate Council is working on selecting the recipients.
- (4) The following awards will be presented at the Spring Student Awards Reception, and several committees are in the process of selecting the recipients:
 - Outstanding Thesis Awards in Science/Technology; Arts/Humanities; Education/Social Science/Business
 - Transforming North Carolina Graduate Student Research Award
 - Outstanding Graduate Student Service Award
 - Outstanding Graduate Teaching Assistant Award
 - Induction into the Alpha Epsilon Lambda Graduate Student Honor Society

Grant and Contract Activity

- Although they do not all show up in the February report due to delays in processing, OSP staff submitted over 44 proposals in February. At present, our total number of fully processed submissions is equal to an additional month of average submission numbers. Dollars requested are approximately \$2 million less than our total requests for all of FY2010.
- Award receipts are also up 4% at \$13.2 million at the end of February, about a month ahead of where we were this time last year.

Special Events

 OSP staff offered workshops on budget development (5 participants) and on contracts and agreements (7 participants). The staff is exploring ways to make these programs available to a greater number of participants while also looking at additional programming needs.

Other Activities

 The Director of OSP led a successful meeting of the North Carolina Chapter of the Society of Research Administrators in Greensboro from March 14-16, 2011.
 Eight research administrators from ASU (5 OSP, 2 OPD, 1 CAS) were among the over 200 attendees. The program included intensive half and full day workshops as well as a day and a half of targeted program offerings.

Upcoming Events

 AGrants/RAMSeS training will begin the week of May 9th for those authorized to sign for a department, dean, center, institute or other campus unit. Faculty and staff will be trained between July 1 and December 31. As of January 1, 2012, campus routing of proposals to externally sponsored projects will be an entirely paperless process.

Graduate Council / March 2011 Julie Taubman, Research Protections

Human Research Protection Program (HRPP) and the IRB:

• We have received 250 requests for review of new human subject research, 33 modifications, and renewed the approval of over 40 studies.

Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC):

The Institute for Lab Animal Research released an updated version of the Guide for the Care and Use
of Animals in Laboratory Research. Institutions receiving Public Health Service funding are required
to follow the Guide. Robin Tyndall is reviewing the Guide to advise our program on any needed
changes.

Institutional Biosafety Council (IBC):

- The IBC requested that the Chancellor approve the Policy on Recombinant DNA.
- The IBC reviewed one study in accordance with the guarantee given to the National Institutes of Health to review research with recombinant DNA.

Export Controls:

- General Counsel agreed that our restricted party screening procedures do not constitute national origin discrimination. We also considered whether our procedures are appropriate for the regulations. The restricted party screening requirements in the Export Control Management Plan currently reads:
 - Faculty and staff members who invite foreign nationals to visit Appalachian are responsible for contacting the Office of Research Protections to ensure that foreign nationals visiting Appalachian are not on a government restricted party list.
- We are considering whether this procedure should be changed to require the restricted party screening procedure for faculty/staff with access to regulated information/technology that host a guest or anticipate sharing regulated information/technology or funds with any non-ASU person. Regulated information/technology could be defined as information: 1) received from an outside party and subject to a non-disclosure agreement or a confidentiality agreement, or 2) generated under a project that is classified, restricted, or proprietary, or 3) generated from a project that is not considered fundamental research.
- The Provost has designated the Associate Vice Chancellor for International Education and
 Development as the individual responsible for ensuring compliance with the Cuban Assets Control

Regulations. Research Protections will assist in ensuring compliance with export controls for travel to Cuba by reviewing the proposed items to be taken to Cuba.

• The Export Control Management Plan needs to be modified to reflect this change.

Intellectual Property:

• We received one disclosure of Intellectual Property. The IP Council was not convened because negotiations regarding the disclosure were already under way.
