#### MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE ACADEMIC POLICIES AND PROCEDURES COMMITTEE November 5, 2008

The Academic Policies & Procedures Committee met on Wednesday, November 5, 2008 in the William C. Strickland Conference Room of I.G. Greer Hall. (*Note: The November 5 meeting recessed at 5:30 p.m. and was continued at the December 3, 2008 AP&P Committee meeting.*) Committee members present: Dr. Jeff Butts (Chair), Dr. Jon Beebe, Dr. Dinesh Dave, Dr. Rodney Duke, Dr. James Ivory\*, Mr. Mark Malloy, Dr. Ron Marden, Dr. Jon Saken, Dr. Kay Taylor, Dr. Carol Truett, Ms. Christy DeStefano, Mr. Andy Ball, Mr. Thomas Brigman (Parliamentarian), and Ms. Kat Gardzalla. (\*Dr. James Ivory was appointed to the AP&P Committee by the Faculty Senate at their November 10, 2008 meeting.)

Committee member excused: Mr. John Boyd.

At 3:00 p.m., Dr. Jeff Butts noted that we have a quorum and he called the meeting to order.

#### MINUTES:

The April 30, 2008 AP&P Committee Minutes were approved as distributed. Please note that Provost Aeschleman approved VOTE 1 and VOTES 3 through 16, however, a final decision regarding VOTE 2 (the request to add a Bachelor of Science degree in Wine Production and Management and the OVN courses) is pending budget considerations.

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#### ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Dr. Butts commented very briefly on the three memos that the AP&P Committee members received with the agenda for today's meeting:

- The SUBCOMMITTEE FOR ANNUAL REVIEW OF POLICIES AND PROCEDURES was appointed on October 10, 2008 and Dr. Rodney Duke has agreed to chair that subcommittee for this academic year.
- A memo was sent to Dr. Michael Ramey, Chair of the Faculty Senate, on October 13, 2008 requesting the Senate's consideration of changes to sections in the *Faculty Handbook* concerning the AP&P Committee (Chapter II and Chapter VII, Section 7.3.4.2).
- On October 6, 2008, a memo was transmitted to the Faculty Senate (per email to Dr. Michael Ramey) asking them to disband the Core Curriculum Committee and transfer its authority concerning the old core curriculum to the AP&P Committee.

#### NEW BUSINESS:

Dr. Glenda Treadaway presented proposals from the College of Fine and Applied Arts for the Departments of Communication; Family and Consumer Sciences; Health, Leisure and Exercise Science; and Theatre and Dance.

Proposals COM-FAA-2007-49 and 50, and COM-FAA-2008-52 and 53 from the Department of Communication were approved as amended as follows (<u>EFFECTIVE: FALL, 2009</u>):

1. Change the course description and the prerequisite statement for <u>COM 2316</u> as follows: <u>COM 2316</u>. Audio Production I (3).F;S.

Audio Production I is a lecture/laboratory course designed to introduce the electronic media/broadcast student to the basic science of sound and audio along with terminology and audio production procedures used in radio, television, and other forms of converged media. Students are instructed in the use of professional state-of-the-art audio production equipment for producing commercials and various types of electronic media programming. Other forms of audio production techniques are also presented, such as preparing audio tracks for video production and general techniques of producing remote broadcasts. Corequisite or prerequisite: COM 2300. Prerequisite: registration is restricted to students admitted to the B.S. degree in Communication, Electronic Media/Broadcasting.

2. Change the course description and the prerequisite statement for <u>COM 3306</u> as follows: <u>COM 3306. Audio Production II (3).F;S.</u>

Audio Production II is an extension of the material covered in Audio Production I. The course is designed to further electronic media/broadcast students' knowledge of the terminology, production procedures, and equipment used in all electronic media production including radio, Internet, and audio for video. Prerequisites: COM 2316; registration is restricted to students admitted to the B.S. degree in Communication, Electronic Media/Broadcasting.

3. Change the course description and the prerequisite statement for <u>COM 4316</u> as follows: <u>COM 4316. Video Production I (3).F;S.</u>

The course introduces the student to the basic techniques of producing single camera, nonfiction programs. Students will produce programs that fall within a variety of genres, including news, public affairs, documentary, essay/commentary, PSAs and promotional. The course examines both the technical and analytical aspects of the production process. Areas covered include concept and storyline development, treatments, scripting, planning, camera techniques, lighting, editing, and exposure to non-fiction styles and genres. Prerequisites: COM 2316 and COM 3316; registration is restricted to students admitted to the B.S. degree in Communication, Electronic Media/Broadcasting.

4. Change the course description and the prerequisite statement for <u>COM 4416</u> as follows: <u>COM 4416. Video Production II (3).F;S.</u>

The course is designed to give upper-level video production students an opportunity to produce professional quality, non-fiction programs, including news, public affairs, documentary, essay/commentary, magazine format, and promotional videos. The course expands on the production skills covered in Video Production I and provides more in-depth analysis of the production process. The course covers advanced production techniques, advanced edit techniques, budgets, copyright, grant writing, distribution, marketing, and career options. Prerequisites: COM 2316, COM 3316, and COM 4316; registration is restricted to students admitted to the B.S. degree in Communication, Electronic Media/Broadcasting.

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Proposals FCS-FAA-2006-12 and FCS-FAA-2007-30, 31 and 32 from the Department of Family and Consumer Sciences were approved as amended as follows (EFFECTIVE: FALL, 2009):

1. Change the course description and the prerequisite statement for <u>FCS 3003</u> to read as follows:

#### FCS 3003. Fashion Merchandising (3).S.

An introduction to and exploration of the fashion industry in which the interrelated nature, development, and operation of the textile and apparel industry within a fashion merchandising context is studied. Lecture three hours. Prerequisite: FCS 2000. (WRITING)

2. Change the title and course description of <u>FCS 4000. Textiles Merchandising: Apparel and</u> <u>Furnishings</u> to read as follows:

#### FCS 4000. Textiles and Apparel Merchandising (3).F.

The student will utilize principles and elements of design and other factors influencing textiles and apparel to acquire and demonstrate merchandising competencies. Observation, analysis and the application of art are utilized and demonstrated through required projects. Lecture three hours. Prerequisites: FCS 2000, FCS 2002, FCS 2050, and ART 1011.

3. Change the title and course description of <u>FCS 4002</u>. Merchandise Display and Promotion to read as follows:

#### FCS 4002. Visual Merchandising, Display and Promotion (3).S.

A study of visual merchandising and promotion within the context of the fashion industry. Creative opportunities are provided to develop skills through individual and group promotional activities and projects. Lecture two hours, laboratory two hours. Prerequisites: FCS 2002 and FCS 3003.

4. Change the title, course description and prerequisite statement for <u>FCS 4003</u>. Fashion <u>Buying and Merchandising</u> to read as follows:

#### FCS 4003. Fashion Buying and Retail Math (3).F.

This course provides the basics of financial merchandise management and decision making for profitable apparel, textile and retail businesses. Merchandise buying is viewed from a qualitative and quantitative perspective. Lecture three hours. Prerequisites: FCS 3003 and ACC 2100.

A motion was made and seconded to consider proposals TD-FAA-2008-24, 26, 27, and 28 from the Department of Theatre and Dance to add four new courses (DAN 2010, DAN 2020, THR 2010, and THR 2020). Several members voiced concerns about these proposals because they have not yet been approved by the General Education Council and they asked the departmental chair, Ms. Marianne Adams if the department would still plan to offer these new courses if they don't get approved for General Education credit. Ms. Adams responded that these courses were created and planned to meet the criteria for the new General Education curriculum so if they are not approved, the department will continue to work on the courses in order to receive General Education credit. Dr. Butts explained that the AP&P Committee is the final approving body for all new courses, so if these courses are approved today, the minutes will be revised to reflect the General Education credit in the course descriptions. Dr. Butts also explained that the General Education Council will be the approving body for determining which courses (new and existing courses) will be included in the General Education curriculum. Each month, or as appropriate, the General Education Council will submit a list of courses approved for General Education credit to the AP&P Committee FOR INFORMATION ONLY to be noted in the AP&P Minutes. A motion was made and seconded to amend the original motion by stipulating that approval of these four new THR and DAN courses is conditional on the acceptance and approval by the General Education Council. The motion to amend failed.

Ms. Marianne Adams also responded to additional questions from the AP&P members about the proposed "On Demand" semester offering for the new courses in Theatre and Dance by explaining that the courses will be offered as needed based on enrollment projections after the new general education curriculum is in place. It was noted that the Department and the College can submit a request to change the semester offering from "On Demand." to "Fall" and/or "Spring" by sending an email to Lesa Felker in Academic Affairs and to Tina Parlier in the Registrar's Office to be noted in the catalog and in the Banner course listings. Departmental chairs and program directors will have another opportunity to change the semester offerings in the course listings whenever the draft copy of their sections of the catalog is sent to them to review before the next catalog is finalized.

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Proposals TD-FAA-2008-24, 26, 27, and 28 from the Department of Theatre and Dance were approved as amended as follows (EFFECTIVE: FALL, 2009):

1. <u>Course additions</u>:

#### THR 2010. Analyzing Style and Form: Theatre (3).F;S.

GEN ED: Fine Arts Designation; Aesthetic Perspective (Theme: "Analyzing Style and Form")

In this course, students will analyze styles and forms of theatre from various cultures and historical eras. They will also examine how their own personal, historical, and cultural perspectives affect their responses to artistic performance.

#### THR 2020. World Culture and Performance Studies (3). On Demand.

*GEN ED: Local to Global Perspective (Theme: "Performance of Culture")* This course applies insights from performance art, theatre, dance and other art forms. Its interdisciplinary approach will allow students to have the opportunities to study the unique role of "performance" in various aspects of our society as well as the world today. The class will explore the concept of performance, and special attention will be paid to issues of multiculturalism and the cultural, political, historical, social, economic and technological contexts of performance studies.

#### DAN 2010. Analyzing Style and Form: Dance (3).F;S.

GEN ED: Fine Arts Designation; Aesthetic Perspective (Theme: "Analyzing Style and Form")

This course will explore the meaning, history, and aesthetics of dance. It will include crosscultural comparisons and the influence of other art forms throughout the history of dance. The course will be primarily lecture with demonstrations, video, and some experiential work.

#### DAN 2020. World Dance (3).On Demand.

*GEN ED: Local to Global Perspective (Theme: "Performance of Culture")* This course will explore dance as a vital contribution to cultural understanding from various regions and cultures around the world including the Americas, Africa, Europe, Asia and Oceania.

Upon approval, this request would allow the prerequisite to be added automatically so that departments/programs will not need to submit a proposal to AP&P to add that prerequisite when no other changes are being made to courses approved for junior level writing in the discipline.

Dr. Mike Mayfield and Carter Hammett-McGarry suggested the addition of "or its equivalent" to that prerequisite to take care of transfers who have actually had a sophomore writing course, plus any other ASU sophomore writing courses that may be approved in the future.

A motion was made and seconded to ask the Faculty Senate to revise Section 7.3.4.2 of the *Faculty Handbook* by increasing the number of voting members on the AP&P Committee from 15 to 16 (12 faculty and 4 students) to allow for a voting faculty representative from University College to be appointed by the Faculty Senate.

Following discussions, the motion was amended to clarify that the AP&P faculty voting membership must include at least one faculty representative from each college or school (except for the Graduate School) and the Library.

Upon approval by the Faculty Senate, Section 7.3.4.2 of the *Faculty Handbook* will read as follows:

#### 7.3.4.2 Academic Policies and Procedures Committee

- a. Members on Committee: 16 12 faculty and 4 students. The student membership (one-year terms) shall include one graduate and three undergraduate students as voting members. The students will serve as liaison between the Academic Policies and Procedures Committee and the Student Government Association. The faculty voting membership of AP&P shall include at least one faculty member from each college or school (with the exception of the Graduate School) and the Library with additional faculty members based on the current proportions of full-time equivalent (FTE) faculty. The term for appointment of faculty is three years. The ex-officio (non-voting) membership of AP&P should include one person from each of the following areas: Dean's Office in each college/school, Provost's Office, Registrar, and Academic Advising. The Provost and Executive Vice Chancellor, or his/her designee, will convene the first meeting and facilitate the selection of a chair, or co-chairs, from among the voting faculty committee members.
- b. Report to: The Provost and Executive Vice Chancellor

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c. Areas of responsibility: The major area of responsibility shall be the curriculum. Other areas are: academic policy; advanced placement; graduation requirements; appeals concerning academic matters from any college, school, department, program, member of the faculty, or student; and matters referred to it by the Provost and Executive Vice Chancellor or the Chancellor.

At 4:50 p.m., an additional item of business was presented by Dr. Jon Beebe.

Dr. Beebe referred to a memo that had been distributed by email to the AP&P membership yesterday (11/04/08) and he noted that copies of that memo have also been provided for today's meeting. In the memo, Dr. Beebe expressed reservations concerning the implementation of the General Education curriculum and he urged the AP&P Committee members to vote for a postponement of the implementation from Fall, 2009 until Fall, 2010. He noted that the reasons for requesting a delay in the implementation are stated in the memo and he asked for feedback and comments from others.

A motion was made and seconded to delay implementation of the new General Education curriculum until Fall, 2010.

#### At 5:00 p.m., a motion was approved to extend the meeting until 5:30 p.m.

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Dr. Dave Haney responded to each of the six concerns that were stated in Dr. Beebe's memo. Discussions continued but no action was taken at today's meeting.

The November 5 meeting of the AP&P Committee recessed at 5:30 p.m. with a motion on the floor. Dr. Butts noted that this discussion will be continued as the first item of business at our next scheduled meeting on Wednesday, December 3, 2008.

Continuation of the November 5, 2008 AP&P Committee Meeting on 12/03/08

The Academic Policies & Procedures Committee met on Wednesday, December 3, 2008 in the William C. Strickland Conference Room of I.G. Greer Hall to continue discussions from the November 5, 2008 AP&P Committee meeting and to consider the items of "New Business" that were submitted for the December 3 agenda.

Committee members present: Dr. Jeff Butts (Chair), Dr. Jon Beebe, Dr. Rodney Duke, Dr. James Ivory, Mr. Mark Malloy, Dr. Ron Marden, Dr. Jon Saken, Dr. Kay Taylor, Dr. Carol Truett, Ms. Christy DeStefano, Mr. Andy Ball, Mr. Thomas Brigman (Parliamentarian), and Ms. Kat Gardzalla. Committee members excused: Mr. John Boyd and Dr. Dinesh Dave.

Dr. Jeff Butts called the meeting to order at 3:05 p.m. and he reminded everyone that our first item of business is to continue the discussions from our November 5 meeting regarding the motion on

the floor that was made and seconded to delay implementation of the new General Education curriculum until Fall, 2010.

Dr. Butts began the meeting in an open forum format by inviting those who wish to express their opinions to do so at this time. He clarified that all visitors will have an opportunity to speak and he asked each visitor to confine their comments to three minutes. He also noted that once everyone has been heard, discussion on the motion will return to the committee.

A number of visitors spoke to the committee. Dr. Jeanne Dubino (Chair of the Department of English) and Dr. Greg Reck (Chair of the Department of Anthropology) spoke in support of the new Gen Ed and noted that their departments are not in favor of delaying the implementation. Dr. Chris Thaxton (Assistant to the Chair in the Department of Physics and Astronomy) expressed concerns from his colleagues about the number of themes for one department. Dr. Butts noted that he had received four emails from faculty and that 3 out of 4 of those who provided feedback supported a delay.

After all visitors were given the opportunity to speak, the discussion regarding the motion on the floor returned to the committee.

Dr. Jon Beebe stated his intent to withdraw the motion; however, Dr. Butts noted that parliamentary procedures will not allow that at this time. Mr. Mark Malloy made a motion to postpone the motion indefinitely, but there was no second to that motion.

Following further discussions, Dr. Ron Marden called for the question and moved to vote on the motion on the floor. Hearing no objections, Dr. Butts called for the vote.

## The motion to delay implementation of the new General Education curriculum until Fall, 2010 was approved by the AP&P Committee.\*
