## Proposals from the College of Arts and Sciences (11) were approved as follows:

Department of Geography and Planning (3)

U\_CAS\_GHY\_2024\_2 Course Addition: GHY 2035 – Global Refugees and Asylum: Forced Migration Across Borders (3) When Offered: Fall This course explores key geography themes and questions pertaining to global forced migration, international mobility, and displacement with specific attention to various social and legal bordering practices that exclude those who do not have the perceived markers of shared social citizenship. Students will explore spatial patterns of transit corridors from key states of origin such as Africa, the Middle East, and Southeast Asia into Europe, particularly into the European Union. Students will research the role geography plays in an individual's "expected" experience along a particular transit route as they pass through a particular migration corridor. As the processes of exclusion have led to some of the most devastating human tragedies, we will investigate geographies of violence from banal and everyday violence to visceral and extreme violence at various spatial scales. A geographical perspective on forced migration across borders is valuable in helping us interpret and critically examine events spatially throughout the world.

U CAS GHY 2024 12 Course Addition: PLN 2100 – Healthy and Just Cities (3) When Offered: Fall; Spring This course covers the interconnections between urban planning, health, and environmental justice, providing an interdisciplinary approach to address the public health, sustainability, and equity implications of the built environment. Students will review significant movements in planning history to the present, studying their impact on contemporary public health and environmental justice. The course will use U.S. case cities to explore different strategies for healthy and just cities, focusing on transportation, housing, green space, sustainable design, and other sectors. Students will use different planning tools and techniques, including land use zoning, building codes, comprehensive plans, and environmental plans. Students will apply these tools to practical scenarios to improve the health and justice of jurisdictions.

Department of Geological and Environmental Sciences (7)

U\_CAS\_GES\_2024\_01 Change the prerequisite statement of **GES 3220 – Fundamentals of Mineralogy (3)** to read as follows: Prerequisite: GES 2250 with a minimum grade of "C-" (1.7). Prerequisites or corequisites: GES 2750, CHE 1101, and CHE 1110, or permission of the instructor.

U\_CAS\_GES\_2024\_02 Course Addition: GES 1050 – Conservation of Natural Resources in a Changing Climate (3) When Offered: Fall; Spring; Summer Session This course explores the intersection between climate change and the management and conservation of natural resources. Course topics will be based on case studies, the latest scientific data and news reports. Course content is designed to provide a comprehensive understanding of how to interpret climate change indicators, how to understand the impact of rising global temperatures on the environment, and provide strategies associated with preserving our planet's vital resources in the face of this anthropogenic crisis.

U_CAS_GES_2024_03	Course Addition: <b>GES 1958 – Environmental Change Through Time: Knowledge for a</b> <b>Sustainable Future (3)</b> When Offered: Fall This course provides an introduction to environmental change, starting from the time through Earth's history to the present day and looking ahead to the future. We will survey the roles that natural climate cycles, ecology, biological evolution, and anthropogenic climate change have played in environmental change at different scales across space and time. Topics also include the more recent effects that humans have had on the environment and climate from the ice age through the industrial revolution and up to the present day. The course introduces students to objective, scientific knowledge related to environmental change and offers a context for understanding natural and human-induced environmental and climate change and for preparing for humanity's role, from the personal to the global, in a sustainable future. Schedule Type: LEC
U_CAS_GES_2024_04	Change the course description and prerequisite statement of <b>GES 4210 –</b> <b>Geology Seminar (1)</b> to read as follows: GES 4210 - Geology Seminar (1) [CAP] When Offered: Fall; Spring GEN ED: Capstone Experience This capstone course will cover technical writing in the geosciences, core competencies for geologists, requirements for professional geologist (PG) licensure, career preparation, and current topics in the geosciences. Prerequisites: Geology majors only, senior standing, and permission of the department
U_CAS_GES_2024_06	Course Addition: <b>GES 3857 – Field Course in Geology and Environmental Science (1-3)</b> When Offered: on demand This field-based course takes students to different sites to explore geological and environmental science in person, on location. Locations for the course may include US National Parks (e.g., Big Bend, Death Valley, Glacier, Yellowstone) or national forests/state parks (e.g., the Black Hills, west Texas reef complex). This course emphasizes field-based fundamentals and creating detailed field notes, via honing observational skills, transcribing and interpreting observations, and making field sketches and specimen descriptions. Course involves physical, sometimes strenuous, outdoor activity that includes hikes with moderate—intense elevation change on unmaintained trails or through landscapes with no blazed trails, while potentially exposed to inclement weather (e.g., intense sun, heat, cold, wind, rain, and/or snow). Overnight camping and preparation of group meals may be required, depending on the trip destination and accommodations. This course will have pre-trip meetings the semester the course is offered, and depending on instructor preference, may require the preparation of poster or presentation on an assigned topic for students to present while in the field. Special course fees will be required to cover transportation, meals, lodging, and other costs (not including tuition). May be repeated for credit when content does not duplicate. Prerequisites: GES 2250 and permission of the instructor.

U\_CAS\_HIS\_2023\_03 Course Addition: HIS 1150 – History and Film (3) When Offered: Fall This course examines the past through film. That examination might focus on analyzing depictions of historical figures and events, or it might employ films as a window onto their time of production and initial reception. The course is thematic, and its content will vary by semester and instructor. Instructors might organize the course around a particular topic, conflict, problem, era, place, or genre. Whatever parameters they choose, all instructors will emphasize discussion, textual engagement, and comparative analysis.

U_DC_2024_01	Establish the Climate Studies (CLI) Attribute.
	The Climate Studies (CLI) Attribute identifies a course that offers content on the causes, consequences and/or solutions to climate change. In the effort to meet students' interest in understanding climate change and how they can contribute to positive climate action, this attribute helps students and advisors to select appropriate courses that grow students' climate literacy and 'response-ability'. Courses tagged with the CLI Attribute will count towards the forthcoming interdisciplinary Climate Studies Minor.
*U_DC_2024_02	Change the Career Drop policy in the Undergraduate Bulletin to the new Course Withdrawal policy to read as follows: (Effective Spring 2025)
	Course Withdrawal An undergraduate student is allowed to withdraw from a cumulative total of no more than sixteen (16) credit hours after the published "Drop-Add" period. (The phrase "cumulative total" should be understood to mean a total of sixteen credit hours of withdrawals over the student's undergraduate career at Appalachian, excluding summer terms.) A student who wishes to withdraw from a course after the published "Drop-Add" period must do so by no later than the ninth week of the fall/spring semester.

The maximum of sixteen (16) credit hours is in compliance with UNC Policy and may not be exceeded. Course withdrawals are noted on the transcript and are included in the attempted hours.

U\_DC\_2024\_03 Establish the Foundations of American Democracy (FAD) attribute to identify courses that offer content that satisfies the Foundations of American Democracy graduation requirement mandated in UNC Policy 400.1.5 (9a.).

In the University Degree Requirements section of the Academic Regulations section of the bulletin add a first paragraph that states:

UNC Policy 400.1.5 (9) stipulates that students entering on or after July 1, 2025, UNC institutions will require, as a condition of awarding a baccalaureate degree, that students successfully complete a course covering the foundations of American democracy. Courses meeting this requirement will have an (FAD) attribute added to them.

a. A course that fulfills this requirement must include substantively the following student learning outcomes:

i. Evaluate key concepts, principles, arguments, and contexts in founding documents of the American republic, including the United States Constitution, the Declaration of Independence, and a representative selection of the Federalist Papers; and,

ii. Evaluate key milestones in progress and challenges in the effort to form "a more perfect Union," including the arguments and contexts surrounding the Gettysburg Address, the Emancipation Proclamation, and the Letter from Birmingham Jail, as well as other texts that reflect the breadth of American experiences.

### **Proposals from the Reich College of Education (19)**

Media, Career Studies, and Leadership (5)

U COE MCL 2024 15 Change the course description of MTL 4830 - Media Literacy (3) to read as follows: MTL 4830 - Media Literacy (3) When Offered: On Demand This course examines what it means to be literate in the technological world of the twenty-first century where digital media pervades in our daily experiences. Key concepts and principles from the fields of media literacy and ecomedia literacy are studied through an examination of movies, advertising, television, journalism and news, the Internet, social media, and algorithms. Emphasis is placed on understanding media texts, media industries, media audiences, and the form and language of a variety of different media including effects on attitudes, beliefs, and behaviors related to human-environment interactions and social inequalities and bias. including their causes, contexts, implications, and interrelationships. Students are provided with critical frameworks for analyzing and decoding media of all forms as well as with tools and techniques applied in several class projects aimed at deconstructing media to illuminate narratives, bias,

and influence on people and planet.

## U COE MCL 2024 17 Course Addition: LIB 2010 – Shelf Help: Introduction to Bibliotherapy (3) When Offered: Fall; Spring Bibliotherapy is defined as the use of literature to promote emotional and mental well-being. In this course, students will explore the therapeutic potential of literature, examining how reading can serve as a tool for selfreflection, empathy, and personal growth. Through discussions, readings, and reflective exercises, students will learn how different genres, narratives, and characters can offer insights into their own experiences and struggles. This interdisciplinary course will draw from psychology, literature, and philosophy to deepen our understanding of the connection between reading and mental health and wellness. Schedule Type: LEC U COE MCL 2024 18 Course Addition: LIB 2020 – True Crime Genre (3) When Offered: Fall; Spring Throughout this course we will explore the genre of true crime, its history and origins, and how its evolution reveals changing attitudes about gender, mental illness, morality, and race. We'll examine and engage with true crime's many forms, from podcasts to docuseries to famous true crime novels. We'll also consider the perspectives from which true crime is told from those involved in a crime, to those who report it, to those who join the investigative process and search for justice. By taking a deeper dive into some of these communities and issues, we will attempt to understand society's obsessions with true crime and why many of us find solidarity and even pleasure in stories of crime and murder. Schedule Type: LEC U COE MCL 2024 19 Course Addition: LIB 2030 – Freedom to Read (3) When Offered: Fall; Spring This course explores the ongoing debates surrounding book challenges and bans in libraries and schools, examining the complex issues of free speech, access to information, and community values. Students will study frequently challenged books, analyzing common themes, intended audiences, and the perceived risks and benefits associated with these works. The course also delves into the arguments of both book censors

and defenders, focusing on the rhetoric and motivations behind their positions. Through critical reflection, students will assess their own views on intellectual freedom and explore strategies for fostering meaningful dialogue about shared community values and decision-making.

Course Addition: U COE MCL 2024 20 LIB 2040 – Culture and Representation in Teen Fantasy (3) When Offered: Fall; Spring This course examines and evaluates identity, representation, intercultural and interpersonal interactions, and cultural perspectives within the teen fantasy genre through interpretation, analysis, and academic discourse.

The fantasy genre involves intricate worldbuilding and careful character creation and development, offering the potential for a rich depth of diversity for students to explore.

The course will also examine legal issues, state policy and labor laws related to work-based learning. Finally, the course will allow the student to develop and plan work-based learning experiences incorporating human dynamics. POS Affected: 411, 456F, 456H, 456I CTE 4750 and OLL 4750 are equivalent. U COE MCL 2024 11 Change the course prefix, title, hours, and description, and add a repeat statement to CTE 4900 - Internship in Workforce Leadership and Development (6-12) [DELETE CTE 4900 and ADD OLL 4900] to read as follows: OLL 4900 - Internship in Organizational Leadership and Learning (3-12) [CAP] When Offered: On Demand **GEN ED: Capstone Experience** This course is designed to provide a capstone experience in which students are able to apply knowledge and skills gained through course work, and to demonstrate their capacity to function successfully in a professional setting. The course will require students to reflect on their own development in the areas of thinking critically and creatively, communicating effectively, making local to global connections, and understanding responsibilities of community membership in the defined career content area and organizational leadership and learning.
